

OBITUARY.

Another old hero of the Revolution has departed from time, in the person of **JACOB REDWINE, Senior**, who departed this life on the 25th of February, 1840, in Coweta county, Ga. He was not only a soldier for his country in the days of '76-'81, but was a soldier of the cross forty-six years. He was a devoted, happy Christian all along through life, who loved the Methodists, laymen and ministers. It was his great pleasure at any time to talk about religion, and he was particularly fond of relating his call, conviction, and conversion, always lamenting his late start in the heavenly road, (he was in his 43d year when he joined the M. E. church.) The Lord however spared him a long time to honour him on earth, as he died in his 87th year. His mind and recollection appeared to be just as good in the very end of his pilgrimage as they ever had been; and though as he approached the gloomy vale, he did not use any extraordinary language, or seem to be in great ecstacy, yet there was a calmness, a serenity, a resignation, that marked the end of the good old man, not doubling but that he would be caught away to the Christian's rest. He remarked a little before his departure, that Dr. Watts was right when he said, "Life is the time to serve the Lord," for it would then have been a gloomy chance for him, suffering in the jaws of death. He lived to see his children to the fourth generation, and died commending his numerous progeny to the Lord; descending to the grave like Jacob of old, full of years, and full of honour.
